

## ROGER CASEMENT BRANCH, CENTENARY YEAR VISIT TO THE SOMME AND FLANDERS.

A group of twenty RCB members and guests departed Dublin Airport and arrived in Brussels Airport in the afternoon of 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2016. The plan was to attend the Last-Post ceremony at the Menin Gate that evening, but due to delays on the journey to Ypres this was not possible.

The next day Saturday, we left the hotel to travel south to the Somme to attend the centenary remembrance of the liberation of Ginchy and Guillemont. The ceremony was co-ordinated by the Somme Association of Northern Ireland and the Royal Irish Regiment commanded by Lt-Col Kenny. This was the seventh year that the RCB participated in the memorial service.

The Branch standard bearers were Noel Murphy and P.J.Brennan. Frank Walshe carried the Association Standard of the 18th Royal Irish Regiment. Other standards on parade apart from the French were the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, the Connaught Rangers the Royal Irish Fusiliers Association and the Portadown Royal British Legion from Co. Down. An Irish Army colour party carried the National Flag. The Royal Irish Regiment colour party carried the Queens Colour and their regimental standard. French veterans carried an assortment of standards.

There were various dignitaries in attendance which included Ms. Heather Humphries Minister for the Gaeltacht and Law reform, Mr John Kennedy from the minister's office as was the representatives of the Glasnevin Trust. The Northern Ireland executive was represented by the Secretary of State. The M.C. paid tribute to all the people who worked to make this day possible from Queen Elizabeth II to President Mary McAlesse and Mr Tom Burke MBE, the Royal Dublin Fusiliers Association and Mr Glen Barr.

During the service the exhortation was delivered jointly by Lt-Gen. David The O'Morchoe, President RBL, Ireland and by the RCB Deputy Chairman Paddy O'Meara who recited the prayer in Irish at the request of the Somme Association. The ceremony concluded with the playing of the National Anthems of Ireland, Great Britain and France.

At the conclusion of the main ceremony a wreath was laid at the French war memorial nearby and a memorial stone was unveiled in remembrance of the Channel Islanders who fell at Guillemont and Ginchy, many of whom served in the Irish regiments.

Our battlefield tour continued with various highlights. The impromptusinging of 'The Green Fields of France' at the grave of 'Willie Mc Bride' was impressive. In the Somme region the group also visited the Somme's principal memorial at Thiepval, the Ulster Tower memorial to the 36th Ulster Division, the Newfoundland Memorial at Beaumont Hammel, the Lochnagar Crater and the Devonshire Trench Cemetery in Mametz where Mike Whelan read a poem at the grave of poet Noel Hodgson.

Later that evening the group returned to Ypres after a long but rewarding day in the Somme.

The following day Sunday, back in Flanders, the group travelled to the Island of Ireland Peace Park in Messines and to the site of the 1914 Christmas Truce football match.

Ws. Fran Kenny from Co. Wexford came on the trip primarily to visit both her grand-uncles graves, being the first in the family to do so, which proved emotional but very fulfilling for Fran and all present. Her uncles were Ptes. Peter and Michael Cush 18th Royal Irish Regiment. Both brothers are buried in cemeteries approximately 5 Kms apart. Her initiative was prompted in her home village of Cranford by projects which researched local soldiers who died in the Great War. The RCB Branch members in uniform performed a dignified service at both graves and piper John Brennan played an appropriate lament at the gravesides,

In the afternoon the group visited several sites in Flanders and performed graveside ceremonies including the grave of Francis Ledwidge, the Field Ambulance station where John Mc Crea, the author of the most popular WW1 poem 'In Flanders Fields' served as a doctor. We also visited the Tyne Cot Cemetery and the trenches located at Hill 62 near Sanctuary Wood.

The Flanders part of our tour was a particular highlight which concluded with the Menin Gate ceremony. The Roger Casement Branch standard was paraded as was the flag of the Four Provinces. Frank Walshe carried the 18th Royal Irish Regiment standard. The band of the Grenadier Guards provided the music and their OCS laid a wreath at the Grenadier's memorial panel at the memorial. The Grenadier's band having amongst other pieces played Elgar's solemn "Nimrod" and both the Belgian and British National Anthems before merching-off with their regimental march "The British Grenadiers," saluting their memorial plaque and the colours on parade as they marched past.

On Monday, on the final day of the visit, after checking out of the hotel, the coach proceeded to the Le Toure monument in Northern France where many Irish soldiers are remembered. This memorial is very close to the site where the Royal Munster Fusiliers went over the top a hundred years ago having had a General Absolution and blessing from Father Gleeson the evening before. Over 800 troops were in attendance and are reported to have sung the Hymn, 'Hail Queen of Heaven' during the service. The following evening not much more than 200 'Munsters' were alive and fit to attend a service at the same spot.

The RCB group, in honour of the dead Irishmen, sang 'Hail Queen of Heaven' at the same spot.

The group then continued to Brussels Airport for the flight back to Dublin after a memorable and enjoyable visit to Flanders and the Somme during the Somme centenary year.

## FROM THE ARMY TO THE ABBEY ..... Clive Geraghty

The two questions which actors are most frequently asked are, "How do you remember the lines and How do you become an actor?". The first question is difficult to answer, and the second nearly impossible to answer to the questioners satisfaction. When it is explained that there is no simple straightforward route into our profession, and that nearly every actor had a different way into it, and that a large amount of luck is also required, disbelief and suspicion of one's motives are usually to be seen on the face of the aspiring actor. This suspicion is intensified when the young person is advised to continue their education at all costs, if possible to university level, thereby ensuring at least an ability to read.

While I cannot say that a coverless Penguin paperback started me on the path to the stage, one certainly provided me with a nudge in the right direction by complementing my already strong interest in literature, books, plays, and poetry.

One day while I was serving in the Air Corps, I was billet orderly, and I found a copy of John Steinbeck's "Of Mice and Men" and "Cannery Row", two great novels in one volume. It bore it's owner's name on the fly-leaf, a chap I didn't know, and who had recently deserted, so I knew he wouldn't be looking for it back. His name was written in a fine copperplate hand, David L O'Driscoll, Technical Wing, Air Corps, Baldonnel.

"Of Mice and Men" stunned me. It was the first real adult book I had come across, and Steinbeck's tragic tale of the two down and out pals, who dream of owning their own small farm was read in one sitting, the sweeping of the billet was hurriedly done before the Orderly Officer came to inspect our dingy home from home, then on to the comic masterpiece Cannery Row.

If memory serves me right I next bought "The Grapes of Wrath", Steinbeck's history of the Joad family among the migrant fruit pickers of California, and week after week, by buying and borrowing, I moved on to Hemingway, Scott Fitzgerald, and Waugh, and the other great writers readily available in paperback. I spent my annual leave one year reading "War and Peace", and even though the pronunciation of the characters names and patronyms eluded me, I devoured Tolstoy, and later Dostoevsky

Time passed, and I became increasingly disenchanted by Army Iffe, so to help pass the time, and, I suppose, to give me some more active participation in matters artistic, I joined an amateur dramatic society, and this is where luck comes into the story. The play we did was "The Heiress", and I had a small part. However, the producer was a professional actor, Ivan Hanly of the R.T.E. Players, and he advised me to join a school of acting. So off I hied me hence to a renowned Academy of Theatre Arts, and enrolled. After a month or so one of the teachers, Ray McAnally, mentioned that extras were required in the Abber.

Theatre for their next play, and hastily organising some leave from the Defence Forces, I presented myself at the Queen's Theatre (then the home of the Abbey) for inspection. On entering this old theatre I was nearly knocked over by the pungent smell of size, but the aura of magic was nearly tangible, and I was hooked.

I never went back to the Academy, and soon a School of Acting was set up in the Abbey under its head Director, Frank Dermody. For a couple of years I played with the Abbey Company and attended classes in the school, until eventually I bought myself out of the Army and became a full time professional actor.

Frank Dermody's greatest attribute as a director and teacher was his ability to pass on his love of the skills involved in great acting, and to inspire young actors to create for their audience evenings of great joy in the theatre. And if the audience is given some food for thought as well, then that's a bonus.

The bonus for me is that, not only have I made my living from doing what I like best, but I have done it in the company of some of the best actors and directors of my generation, in some of the best plays ever written.

Now maybe this would all have happened even if I had not found Davy O'Driscoll's book in that dusty Flying Wing billet, but it's yellowing pages will always sit on my bookshelves, as a lucky charm maybe, or a reminder of how a simple serendipitous event lead me to a life-long love of books and fine writing. And sometimes, seeing it on the shelf among it's more imposing looking companions, I wonder whatever happened to David L O'Driscoll, the chap from the 1955 class of apprentices, who felt it necessary to desert from the Air Corps, to leave his friends, and his book, behind him.

Clive was a member of the 1957 Air Corps Apprentice Class and is a regular contributor to the Link Newsletter. Clive has appeared in numerous stage, radio and TV programs including Sunday Miscellany and Fair City.



### RARE DH VAMPIRE PHOTOGRAPH.

The photo of DH Vampire Air Corps 185 was taken on December 2\*\* 1963 and appears to be the only air to air photograph of an Air Corps DH Vampire aircraft in existence. Vampire 185 was flying as Red 2 with Lt. Jim Casey as pilot, who was undergoing formation flight training with Capt. Tom McBennett.

The picture was taken from Vampire193 the Red 1 aircraft, by Flight-Sgt Paddy O'Meara who was flying with the flight leader Comdt.Jerry O'Connor (later GOC Air Corps). Red 2 was called forward briefly by the Flight Commander to the lead position to facilitate the photograph. F/S O'Meara was the Senior NCO in Fighter Squadron at the time.

The photograph has appeared in several magazines and Air Corps publications. The original photograph which was in 35 MM slide format was taken with a German Regula King K G camera. The camera was presented by Paddy O'Meara to Fit. Sgt Willy Barr, Senior NCO 105 Sqdn (Photo), No 1 Operations Wing in the Air Corps museum on 20th October 2016, 53 years after the event.

## Air Corps News

### Air Corps Cadet Training

The Air Corps Cadetship is an intense period of training and personal development, designed to produce the highest quality pilots capable of delivering the Air Corps' mission.

We would like to give you a small insight into this process by following the progression of the 33rd, 34th and 35th Air Corps Cadet Classes.

The 35th Class have recently joined the Irish Defence Forces and have commenced their Military Training with their Army and Irish Naval Service colleagues in the Military College in the Defence Forces Training Centre.

The 34thClass are completing their Ground School syllabus. They have successfully passed 6 of the 14 Airline Transport Pilot License (ATPL) exams, the most recent being, Operational Procedures, Meteorology and Human Performance & Limitations. This theoretical foundation is crucial to achieve before beginning their flying training.

After much preparation, including military training, theoretical study, simulator sessions and 20 hours of Flying Training, the 33rdClass have reached the seminal milestone of "Wings Course Flight 020", better known as the first SOLO! This sees the Cadet "signing out" an aircraft for the first time and becoming an Aircraft Commander.

Following a pre-solo check conducted by the Chief Flying Instructor. The solo flight consists of flying three circuit patterns around the aerodrome. This marks the first significant "Gate" in the Wings portion of the Cadetship. The class will now progress to the Aerobatic phase, designed to improve their handling skills.


#### 19th Oct 2016
