WW1 Fighter Pilot Remembered . . .

A First World War pilot Major Edward Corringham 'Mick' Mannock has been honoured with a memorial in Dublin's Glasnevin Cemetery. He was a member of the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Air Force during the First World War. Born in Cork on May 24, 1887 he was a pioneer of fighter aircraft tactics in aerial warfare. Mick was the most decorated fighter pilot of WW1 and was credited with 61 combat victories and was awarded the Victoria Cross for gallantry. He died on July 26, 1918, when his aircraft was shot down over France.

The memorial in Glasnevin was unveiled on July 27th 2018 by Paul Kehoe TD, Minister with responsibility for Defence. Also in attendance were Air Chief Marshal Sir Stephen Hillier - Chief of the Air Staff RAF, Brig Gen Kieran Brennan (DCOS) Brig Gen Sean Clancy GOC Air Corps, Mr John Green Director of Glasnevin Trust.

Members of the Roger Casement Branch made their 10th visit to WW1 Battle Sites in Flanders & The Somme during June/July 2018



Day 1: The group departed from Dublin Airport for Brussels where two pre booked vehicles were collected for the drive to Ypres. Due to the late arrival of the aircraft the group were caught in the evening traffic out of Brussels which considerably delayed our arrival in Ypres. As usual the group stayed in the Hotel Ariane where a good relationship has been developed with the hotel staff and management.

Day 2: The group visited the sites south of Ypres including the Island of Ireland Peace Park in Messines and also the site of the 1914 Christmas Truce football match. The adjacent cemetery in Prowse Point contains the grave of Private J.J. Moore who was killed in action with the Dublin Fusiliers. This grave was adopted by the late Tony Roe many years ago and we always paid it a visit at Tony's request on our previous visits. Regretfully, Tony who sadly passed away some months ago, was unable to lay his customary wreath on the grave so the group was honoured to carry out the duty on his behalf and to pay due respect to Private Moore. Sean Ryan who is a member of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers Association laid a written remembrance on the grave. Prayers were also recited.

The group later visited the Grave of Major Willy Redmond in Loker and after Lunch in Popperinge travelled to visit the Field Ambulance Station where John McCrea wrote his most famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'. The group then visited the German War Cemetery in Langemark and then on to the large Tyne Cot Cemetery in Paeschendale. The group attended and participated in the impressive commemoration and wreath laying Service at 8pm at the Menin Gate.

Day 3. The group travelled to the Somme via St.Laurent-Blagny Cemetery in the Pas de Calais region to visit the grave of the war poet Isaac Rosenberg. Michael Whelan recited one of Rosenberg's poems, *"Louse Hunting"* at his graveside. Following our arrival in Albert the group visited a number of local places of interest. After lunch in La Boiselle the group proceeded to Guillemont and participated in the annual Memorial service for the 16th Irish Division which is organised by the Somme Association of Northern Ireland. This service is attended by members of the Northern Ireland and Irish Governments. The Irish Defence Forces were represented by Brig-Gen Philip Brennan who has recently taken up duty in Brussels.

Following the ceremony, the group visited the Lochnagar Crater, the Thiepval Memorial and the Ulster Tower before returning to the hotel in Ypres.

Today tribute was paid to Edward Corringham "Mick" Mannock VC &DSO. Mannock was a British flying ace in the Royal Flying Corps and Royal Air Force during the First World War who has amassed 61 aerial victories, the fifth highest scoring pilot of the war. Mannock and strong Irish roots, his mother was Irish and he was a strong Irish nationalist. The ceremony took place at Glasnevin cemetery and was attended by the Minister with responsibility for Defence Paul Kehoe, and RAF Air Chief Marshal, Sir Stephen Hillier.

04th Aug 2018

Fires on Bray Head expose amazing World War 2 landmark EIRE 8! This landmark had been completely covered by the gorse on Bray Head and amazingly it is still in reasonable condition.

"The signs were built by the Coast Watching Service by the summer of 1944 to warn "belligerent" aircraft that they were flying over a neutral country. Up to 150 tons of stone were used in some of the 83 signs dotted around the coast of Ireland. At the request of the United States air force the number of the nearby lookout post was added, turning the signs into air navigation aids. This assisted American bomber pilots in navigating across the Atlantic." Ref Michael Kennedy - Guarding Neutral Ireland.
